
# DENISON VULTURES PERPLEXED ABOUT WORLD COMING TO END

You may be asking *Sophia, what exactly is a Cozy Mystery?* and to that, I would say *Here is a definition I found online*: "A cozy mystery can be defined as a whodunit featuring an amateur sleuth, a distinctive setting, and a limited number of suspects, most of whom know each other and have a motive for murder... for the most part they are "clean" books that can be read by all ages" (Nancy J. Cohen). So, here is my official review for *Murder Can Mess Up Your Masterpiece: A Haunted Craft Fair Mystery* (available for purchase starting October 29th):

This book is doing so much. Perhaps it is doing The Most. Portrait artists turned amateur sleuth Celeste Cabot paints portraits of people she sees in dreams, and then also unconsciously paints skulls into all of her painting? And then her paintings come to life and help her solve the titular murder? The book wants to be a ghost story but also a murder mystery but also a tiraid against the difficulties of breaking into the independent art scene. It is, as I mentioned early, a lot. The book feels over extended and bloated throughout nby trying to tie up all of its lose plotlines. I'm hoping future books in this new Haunted Craft Fair Series can find a more solid shape in their narratives. I would say a soft 6 out of 10.
